

## **AUTHOR GUIDELINES FOR SASA 2010 ABSTRACTS**

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### **1. INTRODUCTION**

These guidelines include complete descriptions of the fonts, spacing, and related information for producing your abstracts. It is suggested to follow them and if you have any questions, direct them to Dr. Pravesh Debba: Phone +27(0)12 8413421 or email to pdebba@csir.co.za or sasaconf@gmail.com. The maximum length of the extended abstract is 2 pages and must contain a minimum of 800 words.

### **2. FORMATTING YOUR PAPER**

All printed material, including text, illustrations, and charts, must be kept within a print area of 180 mm wide by 230 mm high. Do not write or print anything outside the print area. The top margin should be 25 mm.

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The paper title (on the first page) should begin 35 mm from the top edge of the page, centered, completely capitalized, and in Times 12-point, boldface type. The authors' name(s) and affiliation(s) should appear below the title in capital and lower case letters. Papers with multiple authors and affiliations may require two or more lines for this information.

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Sub-subheadings, as in this paragraph, are discouraged. However, if you must use them, they should appear in lower case (initial word capitalized) and start at the left margin on a separate line, with paragraph text beginning on the following line. They should be in italics.

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List and number all references at the end of the document. The references must appear in alphabetical order. When referring to them in the text, type the corresponding first author surname (for single author for example Cressie (1991)), first and second authors' surname (for two authors for example Berman & Diggle (1989)), first author surname et al. (three or more authors for example Ribeiro et al. (2003)) and year of publication, with/without round brackets as shown at the end of this sentence (Ribeiro et al., 2003).
